

Ultrasound Abdomen and Pelvis

An information guide



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What is an ultrasound scan?

An ultrasound scan is a simple test that involves examining the internal organs of the body using sound waves.

What is involved?

Prior to your examination you may be asked to change into a gown but this is not routinely offered. (You will be provided with a cotton gown but not a dressing gown. You may wish to bring your own).

You will then be asked to lie on a couch in a darkened room with an ultrasound machine beside the couch. The doctor or sonographer will put gel on your skin over the area to be examined; this helps the transmission of sound waves through the skin. This gel may be cold on application but is easily removed after the examination and does not stain your clothing.

The doctor or sonographer will slide a small hand held instrument over the area to be examined and an image will be displayed on the screen. The instrument causes no pain, but if you are tender and the doctor has to press on an area to obtain a clearer image this may cause you discomfort.

Do I need to do anything before I arrive at the hospital for my examination?

Yes, please follow these instructions prior to your examination:

- On the day of your appointment please **HAVE NOTHING TO EAT for 6 HOURS before your examination.**
- A full bladder is required so please **DRINK AT LEAST ONE PINT OF WATER PREFERABLY TWO** at least one hour before your appointment time and do not empty your bladder until after the examination, you may add cordial to the water **but please avoid fizzy drinks.** If you have a bladder catheter please clamp it two hours prior to your scan.
- **DO NOT** consume milk or fat containing food or drinks on your appointment day until after your examination.
- **Please continue to take any medication you are currently taking.**
- If you have **DIABETES** and the appointment time is not suitable due to the management of your diabetes, please contact us on 0161 778 2233 to let us know.

Babies and children under 5

Babies and children under 5 do not need to have a full bladder and can eat and drink as normal before the examination.

Children over 5

Children over 5 need to have a full bladder and should drink an appropriate amount of water an hour before the examination. They should also have nothing to eat for 6 hours before the examination.

Are there any side effects?

There are no known side effects with this examination.

How long will the scan take?

The length of time taken depends on the type of examination. Usually an ultrasound procedure will take between fifteen minutes and half an hour.

What happens after the test?

Provided no other investigations are required you will be able to eat, drink and resume normal activities as soon as you wish. If you have any queries please do not hesitate to ask a member of staff.

The person scanning may not be able to discuss the findings until they have had a chance to study the pictures taken in detail.

A report of the examination will be sent to the referring doctor. You should discuss details of the results, and any necessary treatment, with the doctor who referred you for the test.
