Over the past few months we have made major changes to the way some of our services are delivered. We implemented


these vital service changes and improvements as part of the Healthy Futures and Making It Better programmes and have spent around £100 million on buildings and equipment as a result

Council of Governors

OUNDATION Trusts
are governed by a
council of governors,
who are elected from and
by their members. The
elected governors will
attend meetings of the
council of governors and
hold the Trust Board to
account on behalf of the
local communities, Trust
staff and stakeholders.

Public governors, governors from partner agencies and staff governors will form the Governors' Council. At least half of the council will be elected by the Trust's public FT members.

All public and staff members of the Foundation Trust are eligible to stand for election as a governor. Any member over the age of 16 can stand to be a governor.

The following list will make up the Governors' Council – a total of 42

governors. Under this composition public members will always be the group with the highest number of representatives. Public members will be entitled to vote to elect a governor from the electoral wards they live in.

Changes to services

HE Trust has carried out a series of ward moves and vital major service changes across all its hospitals over the last year.

The changes are part of the Healthy Futures and Making it Better reconfiguration programmes which were agreed by the Secretary of State for Health at the time and an Independent Review Panel in 2007. The purpose is to ensure health services remain modern, safe and sustainable by centralising the resources, skills and expertise of doctors and nursing staff.

Around £100m of capital investment has been spent across the Trust as part of the service developments.

Vascular Services have been centralised at The Royal Oldham Hospital in a brand new unit and inpatient breast surgery has been centralised at North Manchester General Hospital.

As part of Healthy Futures, the Trust is creating two specialist

Day Case

Day Cas General centres for emergency trauma and orthopaedic services at North Manchester and The Royal Oldham Hospitals. The purpose is to separate emergency and planned (or elective) surgery thus bringing together teams of specialist skilled doctors and nurses so that they can provide the very best care for patients. This means we have transferred services between Rochdale Infirmary and The Royal Oldham Hospital and Fairfield General and North Manchester General Hospitals to achieve this. This is the most efficient and effective way to use staff skills, expertise and resources to provide improved and safer services for

These moves have only been possible as part of the Healthy Futures programme. They have helped create the largest Vascular unit in Greater Manchester; the General Surgical Units at The Royal Oldham and North Manchester General Hospitals serve populations in excess of

patients.

400,000 and are again the largest in Greater Manchester. This allows for greater specialisation than would have been the case in the former smaller services.

A new surgical triage unit has opened at North Manchester and the High Dependency Unit at Oldham has expanded. These service changes are all designed to improve the surgical management of both the elective and emergency surgical patient.

The changes to surgical inpatient services have resulted in clinical benefits and improvements to patient treatment and care. The centralisation of a number of services means a more efficient and effective use of clinical and nursing staff skills and resources to deliver improved services for patients.

As part of Making it Better, North Manchester and The Royal Oldham Hospitals are benefitting from new and enhanced facilities for women and children. See page 8 & 9.

New Children's ward is one year old

AST summer we opened our new unit for the care of pregnant women, babies and children at North Manchester General Hospital. June marked one year since the £35m unit was unveiled with the help of the Lord Mayor of Manchester. Since then, our hospital staff have welcomed thousands of patients and visitors to the new unit, including children who have been treated in the special Kids Observation and **Assessment Liaison Area** (KOALA).

On the second floor are the delivery suites, which feature private ensuite rooms. The top level is home to the antenatal and postnatal wards providing

warm, comfortable surroundings for parents and parents-to-be.

Eight-year-old Demitra Camara recently tried out the facilities at the hospital. Having a two day stay on the children's ward to remove a dental abscess, Demitra didn't want to go home as she had her own TV and DS to play with on the ward! Her mother, Della Laryea, said: "The unit is really nice and welcoming for children. I was impressed with the building and the hardworking staff for whom nothing was too much trouble."

Friendly new unit is right medicine for poorly children at Oldham

BRAND new dedicated facility to treat poorly children has opened at the The Royal Oldham Hospital. The new Paediatric Observation and Assessment Unit (POAU) opened at the end of June 2011 to provide a child friendly environment

where children can be cared for by a team of skilled children's nurses and doctors.

Previously, children under observation or needing acute medical care would be kept in the A&E department alongside adults or admitted to the children's ward at the hospital.

But the new unit now offers an area where children can be observed under the care of a paediatrician for a period of up to six hours.

The Trust has similar facilities at North Manchester and Fairfield hospitals.

Construction on Oldham's new £44m unit on schedule

onstruction work on the Trust's new £44m women and children's development at The Royal Oldham is ahead of schedule.

Contractors and the Trust's department of estate development are making steady progress on the development which is due to open in December 2012. The new unit will provide services for women, babies, children and young people from Oldham, Rochdale and surrounding districts.

The development will represent the largest capital investment made to date by the

Trust and is an integral part of the Making it Better programme to improve children's, maternity and neonatal services across Greater Manchester.

Once complete, The Royal Oldham Hospital will be one of three regional centres providing the highest level of intensive care to the smallest and most vulnerable babies. The hospital will provide the modern facilities, staff and skills required to care for the most complex cases. The new neonatal unit will house 37 neonatal cots and 110 expert staff will treat around 550 babies each year. Parents of small and

vulnerable babies to the north of the city will no longer have to travel as far to access the highest level of care. It is expected that the new children's and maternity service will treat approximately 8,000 children a year from the Oldham, Rochdale and adjacent districts, in a new state-of-the-art children's unit.

Vinci Construction, who is the lead building contractor, is supporting the Trust's new In Your Hands fundraising appeal through raising money in conjunction with MedEquip4Kids. See p13.

New UCC opens at Rochdale Infirmary replacing A&E

HE new GP-led
Urgent Care Centre
(UCC) has seen over
17,000 new patients in four
months to August, roughly
100 - 150 per day, since it
opened in April 2011.

The UCC replaced the A&E department and Walk-in centre at Rochdale Infirmary as part of Healthy Futures. The UCC is open 24 hours, 7 days per week, 365 days a year. It is run by experienced nurses, nurse practitioners and a GP. They can treat non life-threatening walk-in injuries and ailments, which don't require an A&E department,

but cannot wait for a GP or on-call doctor's appointment.

A&E is for life-threatening and serious situations. The nearest A&E departments are at:

- Fairfield General Hospital, Rochdale Old Road, Bury, BL9 7TD
- The Royal Oldham Hospital, Rochdale Road, Oldham, OL1 2JH
- North Manchester General Hospital, Delaunays Road, Crumpsall, M8 5RB

Your nearest A&E facilities for children are also based at these sites.

Clinical Assessment Unit (CAU)

A new overnight and short stay Clinical Assessment Unit (CAU) for adults opened at the same time as the UCC on 4 April 2011. The new 12 bed unit (with six trolleys) provides rapid patient assessment and treats patients who have been referred directly from their local GP, from the community, or come via the new Urgent Care Centre. Patients are assessed, observed and treated on the CAU usually up to a maximum of 48 hours. Within the CAU is also the specialist day case Programmed Investigations Unit (PIU) which provides regular planned treatment and management of patients with chronic disease.

Rochdale Infirmary does NOT have an Accident & Emergency Department.

New high-tech CT scanner at Fairfield to benefit patients

VER 8,000 patients a year are set to benefit from a £626,000 investment in radiology services at Fairfield General Hospital in Bury.

The Trust has recently installed a brand new CT scanner which is housed in the x-ray department at the hospital. The new state-of-the-art scanner is a replacement for the previous scanner which was 10 years old. The new scanner delivers high

quality images at a significantly less radiation dose.

Dr Judith Mather (pictured), site lead for radiology at Fairfield, said: "The new scanner is faster than the old 4 slice CT. While this does not mean we can scan more patients, it allows us to collect a large amount of data very quickly, which makes the procedure much more comfortable for the patient and ensures a top quality examination. The detail is

excellent, and the processing software allows us to create images in different planes and also in three dimensions."

In October 2010, the Trust Board agreed to invest £2.2 million in three new 'high-tech' modern CT scanners for The Royal Oldham, North Manchester and Fairfield General Hospitals. A new CT scanner was replaced at Rochdale Infirmary in 2008.



Staff Awards 2011

RITISH Olympic athlete and TV presenter Sally Gunnell OBE was this year's special guest at the Trust's annual Staff Awards in July.

The awards consist of 12 categories which recognise the very best of patient care, dedication and innovation among staff within the hospitals run by the Trust. Nominations for awards are put forward by Trust staff.

Clean Bill of health for hospitals

HE Trust and its hospitals were given a clean bill of health and a glowing report in March 2011 by the independent regulator of health care in England, the Care Quality Commission (CQC), following a routine review by inspectors.

The Trust received a series of spot checks and visits by the CQC at each of its hospitals in January 2011

The CQC found all our hospitals to be fully

'compliant' and meet all the essential standards and outcomes of quality and patient safety.

Then in July 2011 North Manchester General Hospital was again given a clean bill of health by the CQC following a review inspection as part of its national dignity and nutrition programme. The programme focuses on whether people are treated with dignity and respect, and whether they get food and drink that meets their needs.

The review, which was carried out in May and covered 100 hospitals randomly selected across England, was part of a targeted inspection programme in acute NHS hospitals to assess how well older people in particular are treated during their hospital stay. North Manchester General was found to be 'compliant' with meeting all the essential standards to ensure that patients are treated with dignity and respect and their nutritional needs are met.

Quality Accounts 2010/11

UALITY ACCOUNTS are annual reports to the public from NHS providers about the quality of services they provide. They are required by Government in an effort to strengthen and maintain the focus on quality of care for patients.

The Trust has published its Quality Account report for 2010/11 which is available on the Trust and NHS Choices websites. The report focuses on the work in the Trust to

improve patient safety, clinical effectiveness and patient experience.

Cardiology & Stroke Consultation

lanned changes to improve cardiology and stroke services across the Trust have been subject to an independent clinical review carried out in March 2011 by Professor Roger Boyle, the Government's former lead for cardiology and stroke. The transfer of elements of the cardiology service at Rochdale Infirmary, such as the interventional work and day services provided at the Silver Heart Unit, are subject to a formal public consultation and engagement exercise.

In order to ensure that our local communities have a voice in the configuration of Cardiology and Stroke Rehabilitation services it was agreed that a full public consultation should be undertaken. The 12 – week public consultation on cardiology and stroke services will be led by Healthy Futures and begin in October 2011. Local patients, public, partners, staff and key stakeholders will be consulted. The feedback will be used to influence the final decision that will determine the preferred option for the future of both Cardiology and Stroke Rehabilitation Services across the north east of Greater Manchester.
